

#### **DFO/CCG Procurement Delegation**

- Client Authority
  - Low dollar value requirements
  - \$10K for goods and services
- Procurement Hub
  - Up to \$25K for Goods
  - Services
    - Up to \$7.5M for Competitive Servies and \$200K for NC
  - Construction
    - Up to \$750K for Competitive/\$100K NC
  - Exceptions
- PSPC and Common service providers
  - Manadatory commodities
  - Manage procurement greater than allocated delegation





#### **DFO/CCG** is Committed to Indigenous Procurement

#### **History**

- Since 2013, a voluntary internal target of \$9M/Year for Indigenous procurement has been met;
- In FY 2018-19 ADM PSPC challenged DFO/CCG to an 1% increase year over year until 2022;
- It is anticipated that a request from ISC will be shared shortly with department heads requesting commitment to a 5% spend target;
- Indigenous Procurement has been stable however, there is always room for improvement

#### **Indigenous Procurement Policy within DFO**

There are 3 main areas that impact DFO contracting pertaining to Indigenous Procurement:

- Procurement Strategy for Aboriginal Business (PSAB): the government strategy to encourage Aboriginal firms to pursue contracting opportunities with the Government of Canada
- Comprehensive Land Claims Agreements (CLCA): when undertaking contracting activities that take place in a land claim settlement area, contracting authorities must examine applicable agreements for any aboriginal participation requirements
- Nunavut Settlement Area, <u>a new Directive</u> on Government Contracts, Including Real Property Leases, in the Nunavut Settlement Area

<ul> <li>Need to increase clients/contracting officers awareness and knowledge of Set-Aside, PSAB, CLCA, NSA procurement as well as Indigenous business capacity.</li> </ul>	Providing dedicated Indigenous procurement training to clients/contracting officers  • Engage GC subject matter experts in Indigenous Procurement to inform contracting officers  • DFO Procurement Trainers to facilitate sessions with clients	
<ul> <li>Contracting officers are usually not involved at the early planning stages and have little visibility into upcoming contracts that could be of economic interest to Indigenous groups until receipt of requisition.</li> </ul>	DFO/CCG has recently approved a Departmental Procurement Plan allowing for enhanced monitoring and earlier involvement of contracting officers in the procurement planning process.

Little post audit verification .</li> </ul>	The Contract Review Committee will be tracking and reporting Indigenous procurement on a quarterly basis to highlight strategic importance;.  All federal departments and agencies procuring over \$1 million are required to set multi-year Indigenous procurement objectives.  Procurement Services to conduct a review of the vendor listing in our financial system to ensure it aligns with NIFI analysis and seek PSAB clarification when required
